2013 Friends of Foley Mountain Membership Structure

The Board of Directors of the Friends of Foley Mountain (FOFM) have made some changes to the membership fee structure for 2013 to bring us into compliance with Revenue Canada Policies on the issuance of charitable tax receipts.

All members of the FOFM will continue to receive a charitable tax receipt equivalent to the dollar amount of the membership category they select. The FOFM will no longer be involved in the issuance of Rideau Valley Conservation Authority (RVCA) annual passes.

The purchase of an RVCA Annual pass which allows access to Foley Mountain and other Conservation Area properties will now be the sole responsibility of the RVCA. However the RVCA has volunteered to provide a free annual pass directly to all members of the Friends of Foley Mountain who purchase a membership with a value of \$50 or more.

FOFM President's Report

Things are happening at Foley Mountain!

Your Board of Directors has been very active in 2012 and is already planning events for 2013. Our Annual General meeting was held in May to coincide with official opening of the new Outdoor Learning Centre based at the Silversides Log Barn. This gorgeous historic building had been dismantled and relocated to the group camping area at Foley Mountain and is now being fitted up with services and furnishings. The event provided a great opportunity to thank all those who contributed to making this project a reality- the RVCA staff, the contractors, the donors and sponsors and especially to Jack Herbert who provided \$12,000 to the Friends of Foley Mountain to go towards the barn restoration. The weather was perfect for this event which allowed Rebecca Whitman to lead a nature hike to the Beaver Pond lookout followed by a barbecue hosted by your Board that was open to all. Once again the Friends of Foley Mountain held its canoe/kayak auction which was our main fundraiser for 2012 ,raising \$3000 for our projects. This year we printed 3000 tickets - up from 2500 in previous years- and still managed to sell out all the tickets by mid-August. The draw was held on Sept 1st and the lucky winner of the kayak was Deb Holmes of Grand Valley Ontario. Thank you to all the residents and visitors who purchased tickets and supported the Friends of Foley Mountain. A special thank you to Mountain Equipment Co-op for donating the paddling lifejackets; to Trailhead in Kingston for donating the canoe cart; and to

Swift Canoe for providing the kayak at wholesale cost.

The Board is now planning its main 2013 fundraiser which will again feature the fun filled Community Auction. So please circle Friday August 9th on your calendars for this great event.

We are also working with the Rideau Valley Conservation Authority in fitting up the Silversides Outdoor Learning Centre to allow it to be used by visitors and school groups.

The Friends of Foley Mountain are very pleased to announce that we have received a \$23,000 donation from Northland Power to wire the log barn and install a solar panel and inverter/battery system to provide an environmentally friendly energy source for the building. Northland Power is a natural partner for this project as they are developing a number of solar farms in the Township of Rideau Lakes and are pleased to be able to contribute to Foley Mountain as new corporate citizens in our region. The solar system is being installed in November of this year to allow additional use of the building in the late fall and winter seasons.

FOFM is also working with the RVCA to seek sponsors and partners for the purchase of equipment and teaching aids for the environmental education programs that will be based at the site. To that end, a

Autumn Adventures

The cool temperatures and sunny weather brought on by autumn make for the perfect conditions to visit Foley Mountain for a hike in the woods and a stop at the Spy Rock lookout. With the picturesque Village of Westport nestled at the base of the hill and the mixed Eastern Ontario forests covering the rolling hills and bordering surrounding lakes, the views are spectacular.

Have you ever wondered why there is such a beautiful show of fall colours? It all has to do with how trees go about their daily business of being producers as well as how they prepare for winter. Producers are the only living things that can convert the energy of the sun into food energy using carbon dioxide and water. This process is called photosynthesis and occurs thanks to a pigment called chlorophyll which colours leaves and other plants green. During the spring and summer months, photosynthesis hap-

pens at full force with excess sugars being stored in the tree for later use. The strong green pigments that allow this to happen mask any other colours contained in the leaves. As the days shorten and temperatures start to dip, these food factories start to shut down and the green of the chlorophyll fades. The fading green gives way to colours like brown, orange, and red that are also contained in the leaves.

With the extended drought this summer, many people were worried that the colour show would be less than spectacular. However, the best fall colours seem to stem from water shortages towards the end of summer combined with sunny days and cool evenings in the early fall. The equation must have been just right in 2012 as the forests were certainly alight with brilliant reds, oranges, and yellows over the Thanksgiving weekend!

Deciduous tree like maples, oaks, and beech drop their leaves in the winter to help prevent water loss. Coniferous trees like pine trees have needles that stay on during the whole season but are specially designed to minimize water loss during periods of water scarcity. They have a small surface area and a thick waxy outer layer to hold water in during the cold winter weather. Believe it or not, this is a very similar design to a plant like a cactus that relies on water conservation as a means of survival in the dry and often cold desert ecosystem. Photosynthesis can still happen in needles during the winter with enough sunlight but the rate of reaction will be far less due to colder temperatures.

So next time you are out on Spy Rock during a beautiful fall day, you can appreciate all the hard work that has gone into producing such a beautiful show!
